overview

The Wall to Wollondilly (W2W) Project will protect, maintain and restore the natural environment between the Wingecarribee Reservoir and the point where the Wollondilly and Wingecarribee Rivers meet.

The project involves weed control, revegetation, community training and workshops all focussed on improving the health of the Wingecarribee River. We'll also be permanently protecting patches of critically important bush in the Southern Highlands.

context

Clearing of lands in the Wingecarribee Shire has left much of the Wingecarribee River in a highly-degraded state. The spread of weeds is chocking the river. This means that the birds and animals that we share our environment with are finding it harder and harder to move between their habitat patches.

The Wingecarribee River is one of the best places to see the Platypus in the wild. However, if the riverbanks continue to erode and remain choked by weeds it is likely that the water quality will decline and fewer Platypus will call our local river home.

This project aims to protect the river for the Platypus and other river dwellers (people included) by protecting the vegetation that is left, improving its condition through weed control, increasing its extent and connectedness through revegetation and underpinning it all with collaboration and community based effort. By improving the quality, quantity and connectedness of the vegetation, the project will assist migratory security and climate adaptability for a large suite of fauna species.

To help achieve this goal, we need your help.

What is being funded?

A range of on-ground activities are being funded with a focus on creating and relinking habitat including:

- 1. Professional control of woody weeds impacting the river's health,
- 2. River Care with hands-on restoration and training activities open to the whole community,
- 3. Professional bush revegetation,
- 4. Installation of Tree Hollows to provide Habitat for a range of threatened and common species,
- 5. Land conservancy through appropriate mechanisms such as in-perpetuity covenants

The W2W project can only be successful with the commitment and combined efforts of landholders, community groups, government, non-government organisations and other industry groups.
